# MAJOR ANNOUNCEMENT regarding the next two Board of Managers Meetings

I told him I would pick him up at his home in Brookfield so we drove together. On the 5 ½ hour drive each way we talked about family, politics, sports, current events and of course the SAR. It was a very enjoyable drive and it seemed to make that drive a lot shorter.

Franz has marched in parades, helped with a Flag Day Concert, participated in Revolutionary War Days and numerous cemetery markings over the year with us at the Fox Valley Chapter.

Franz has been awarded the Silver Council of Presidents Medal, Patriot Medal, State Distinguished Serve Medal, Bronze and Silver Roger Sherman Medals, Bronze and Silver Color Guard Medals, Bronze and Silver Good Citizenship medals and Certificate of Appreciation.

Franz' passing was a great loss for the Illinois Society. He will be missed.

### Reflections On Ukraine

As with many Americans, I spend most

evenings watching the latest news from Ukraine. The headlines are appalling, and

images of destruction and the suffering people (especially children) are heart-wrenching. At the same time, though, the forti-



tude of the Ukrainian people is a shining example to the world: The man standing in front of a Russian tank ala Tiananmen Square in 1989, the old woman giving a Russian soldier a handful of sunflower seeds to be fertilized by his body after he is killed, the man leaping on a Russian armored personnel carrier while waiving the Ukrainian flag. Such acts of defiance, as expected, provide sound bites for the media. But much more is going on behind the scenes. Reportedly, thousands of Ukrainian civilians have taken up arms and joined Ukrainian soldiers in fighting off the Russian invaders. We have not yet heard their stories but wonder: How many have died? How many have suffered grievous injuries? How many will now suffer psychologically for the rest of their lives? Most have paid a high price, but they chose their course and most will be forever proud of their stand. Was this not also true of our patriot ancestors at the onset of the American Revolution?

Your ancestor almost certainly went through a period of soul-searching before committing to the path of revolution. In the months and years leading up to Lexington and Concord, there was ample time to consider the choices, and I'm sure that the daily news back then was as important to our ancestors in shaping their choices as today's news is to us. But when the first British troops left Boston to seize the rebels' arms caches, it was decision time. The Patriot rebels likely faced the approaching British troop formations with the same dread that the Ukrainians felt while confronting the Russian tank columns. Imagine your ancestor facing the British army, then the most powerful military in the world! He may have begun having some doubts as to the course he had taken. In the heat of the moment his decision seemed logical. But sober reflection may have brought the realization that he was gambling not only his own life and future, but that of his wife and children. Thomas Paine wrote of the "summer soldier" and the "sunshine patriot", but it is understandable that, as the war dragged on and

#### Minutes of the Illinois Board of Managers Meeting February 12, 2022 in Bloomington, IL

The meeting was opened at 8:30am by President Mike Campagnolo

- Pledge and SAR pledge.
- Invocation by Gordon Bidner
- In attendance: 14. Gordon moved to suspend the rules to have a quorum. Passed unanimmously.
- Mike made an announcement of Franz Herder's passing and made a brief commmemoration.
- Steven Kern recognized for attending his first BOM mtg.

#### Committee Reports

- National Trustee: Toby Chamberlain
  - No report. Nothing happening.
  - Toby is also the national chair for the national newsletter contest. Suggestion made to change the BOM name.
  - The nominating committee is having a hard time finding people for secretary, treasurer and recording secretary.
  - Patriot Medal: Three nominations received. Two approved for two of the three available medals.
  - Toby has recruited 19 new George Washington Fellowship members.
- Mike Campagnolo comments:
  - Discussion about treasurer's turnover
  - Gordon Bidner suggested consolidating project committees and making sure that committees are actually doing their work.
     Committee members need to continually remind their contacts to meet contest deadlines.
- GLD report: VPG Bill Austin:
  - GLD meeting and ILSSAR BOM meetings will be combined this year on first weekend of November.
  - VPG attendance makes any meeting a district meeting for double points.
- President's report Mike Campagnolo:
  - Mentioned that he has been honored to be the president and thanked everyone.
  - His first year as president was tough due to COVID requirements forcing BOMs to be virtual on Zoom.
  - Four confirmed cemetery markings set for this year.
  - Bill Austin started a discussion about how to mark graves of SAR compatriots.
     Several good ideas presented.
- Senior Vice President: Chuck Dobias
  - Asked for patience and understanding

because he is new to his upcoming presidency.

- Incoming Sr. VP said there should be a breakout session for officers learning about their new positions.
- Steve Kern discussed his booklet detailing the duties and responsibilities of officers and committee chairmen.
- Secretary report: Drew Robinson.
  - Started 2021 with 1012 members, gained 122 members, 72 brand new members and ended with 1001 due to deaths and other member number adjustments.
  - The electronic dues collection went well due to the collections going straight to Drew with help from a remote collection deposit machine from the bank.
  - Drew has complete lifetime histories of chapter payments that can be made available if requested.
  - Gordon Bidner asked about the percentage of members who paid electronically. Drew said about 30%. Due to the electronic system, Drew said he can see how many times compatriots open their invoices and look at them. (19 times in one case)
  - Due to reinstatements and new members, the 1001 member count is a low point and is aleady on the way up from there.
  - When the chapter presidents receive new applications they should warn the applicants that the time to process them is a long one, about twelve weeks now vs. about eight weeks a few years ago.

Treasurer Report: Lee Braden - absent

- Mike talked about how the treasurer and secretary positions will be combined to be done by one person.
- A brief description about what would be required is needed.
- Gordon Bidner made motion that "For the upcoming year, we combine the secretery and treasurer positions on a temporary basis until we are able to get the treasurer position filled for one year."

   Consensus was yes since it is a temporary situation. The constitution doesn't need to be changed in order for that to happen.
